

Drones

Letter Writers please get writing

How many people know that a new, sinister weapon has become part of British military strategy? Drones, officially "unmanned aerial vehicles" (UAVs), have been flown frequently in Afghanistan since 2008. Britain purchases its drones from Israel and the US, as well as manufacturing them at Thales UK. They are operated in conjunction with the US, directed from an airbase in Nevada, though soon to be moved to RAF Waddington, Lincs. They are highly controversial. They have, for instance, repeatedly been directed like a video game - from an armchair in a distant continent for the extrajudicial execution of an individual 'terrorist', at the same time killing an

unknown number of civilian bystanders. They foreshadow warfare without risk to an attacker's own troops; and are being used in the ongoing attacks on Gaza. For detailed information see the CND drones leaflet & Guardian article.

Can we this month write to our MPs telling them that we firmly oppose the use of drones & want the Defence Secretary to review their use? You have a chance to inform others about these secret weapons if you send a copy of your letter to your local paper.

Some possible points you might like to use:

- These weapons have been introduced surreptitiously, without parliamentary or other public discussion of the principles involved.
- Drones are weapons which introduce a new, unpredictable and

- uncontrollable dimension into modern warfare.
- They are an effective recruiting sergeant for future terrorists when, as usually happens, innocent people near an intended target - who is being executed without any trial - are killed.
- The same is true when the drones fly continuously over suspect areas, for reconnaissance or to intimidate, terrifying the population.
- Drone operations are inextricably linked to the US Defence Department.
- Imagine if Pakistan or Israel were flying drones over this country in order to 'execute' persons they don't like?

345 drone strikes: four civilians dead?

Are the UK government's figures on drone casualties really credible?

As the UK doubles its fleet of armed Reaper drones in Afghanistan and starts shifting their control to British soil, new figures have underlined the lack of credibility of UK claims concerning civilian deaths at the hands of these remotely-piloted killing machines.

On 26 October, Number 13 Squadron was reformed at RAF Waddington, from where it will start piloting five new British Reapers in early December. Until now, British Reapers have been piloted by RAF personnel from Creech air force base in Nevada, USA.

According to a 1 November statement by defence minister Andrew Robathan, the UK has conducted at least 345 drone strikes in Afghanistan since May 2008, firing 293 Hellfire missiles amd 52 GBU-12 laser-guided bombs.

More strikes are known to have taken place since these figures were compiled.

Britain currently deploys a total of 335 drones in Afghanistan, including the tiny 'Black Hornet' and the Israeli-built Hermes 450. However, only the Reapers are armed.

Not credible

Peace campaigner Chris Cole - who first drew attention to the figures on his Drone Wars UK blog - notes that the number of British strikes in Afghanistan (345) almost exactly matches the number of reported strikes by the CIA in Pakistan (350).

An analysis of credible reports by the Bureau of Investigative Journalism puts the reported civilian toll from the CIA attacks at 475-885 deaths. By contrast, the MoD admit to only 4 civilian casualties in Afghanistan, in a single incident in March 2011.

'The figures suggest [either] that the UK is 100-200 times better at drone warfare than the US,' Cole notes, or that the UK figures 'are just not credible'.

Meanwhile, new figures from the US air force have revealed that there have been 1,160 US drone strikes in Afghanistan since the beginning of 2009, with drone strikes making up 9% (333 strikes) of the 3,600 aerial attacks in the country this year, up from 5% in 2011.

'The [drones] are growing in importance while the rest of the military is receding,' notes Noah Shachtman, editor of Wired magazine's national security blog.

According to The Guardian, the British government 'has yet to decide' whether its Reapers will remain in Afghanistan after 2014, following the withdrawal of NATO 'combat forces'.

India, Pakistan, Israel and maybe North Korea followed the five 'official nuclear powers' in developing their own nuclear weapons. Other countries in Europe (namely Belgium, Germany, the Netherlands, Italy and Turkey) have US nuclear weapons deployed on their soil and even train with them along the NATO nuclear sharing arrangement. They have all failed to honour their commitments and obligations towards international law and have blocked possible roads to global nuclear disarmament. Meanwhile, the process of proliferation continues, as one cannot claim to have nuclear weapons for its own security, while ruling out the same right to others. The risks of proliferation of nuclear weapons from civil nuclear programs are increasing,

while not enough support is provided for peaceful cooperation on the inalienable right of humans to safe, clean and sustainable energy.

BANg, the European Youth Network for Nuclear Disarmament, believes it is time to turn the tide. Nuclear weapons are immoral and illegal. The time for nuclear disarmament is now! We believe a nuclear weapons free Europe is a necessary step towards nuclear disarmament and peace worldwide.

As a network we join the worldwide struggle for nuclear disarmament while focusing, as a first step, on Europe.

We aim to:

- Bring young people together and share ideas on peace and disarmament,
- Inform people on the threat of nuclear weapons and the urgency of disarmament,
- Promote non-violent action for a more peaceful world,

Expanding the cadets and 'military ethos' in schools

What are the cadet forces?

Around 140,000 13-18 year olds participate in various cadet forces of which 45,000 are school based. The reason for them is stated as recruitment, creating awareness to ensure the continued support of the population, and 'wider personal development'.

How will the cadets be expanded?

The government announced more funding to be given to expand the cadets into state schools - targeting free schools and academies in particular.

Why is this happening? Who benefits?

Following the government's intention to increase the Reserve forces - the

cadets will be an important source for recruits. Government also intends to have military academies in the state school sector.

Why is this a problem?

- •At a time when spending on other youth services is being cut this is being expanded
- The policy is based on a one-sided view of 'military ethos' and the assumption that it is an appropriate 'solution to social problems'
- Negative aspects of the 'military ethos' - deters awareness of alternatives to conflict, so favouring military solutions. Abuse of cadets at camp?
- Little evidence that military is better than other youth services at helping young people develop useful life skills
- No public consultation
