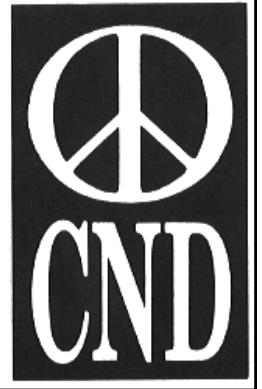

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Turn up the heat: send the UK to Mexico

The UK hasn't RSVP'd to an invitation from Mexico to attend a crucial conference in 2014 on the humanitarian consequences of nuclear weapons - a follow-up to this year's landmark meeting of 127 states in Oslo.

We know that pressure works.

Last time round we saw a leaked email from the government panicking about the flak they were getting from all of you over their non-attendance in Oslo.

In the name of Peace not War

"Somebody should visit John's grave". A vivid childhood memory is hearing my granny urge that a family member pay respects at her brother's grave in France. It was 1969 and John had been dead for 51 years, but she often reminisced about his death on 15 October 1918. He had been serving Mass in the trenches as poison gas - yes, he was a victim of chemical warfare - wafted onto the congregation, closely followed by German soldiers with bayonets. Well, granny didn't live to see myself and other family members visit his war grave in Northern France in 1986. I don't recall her perceiving John's death as anything other than a personal and family tragedy. He wasn't a dead hero. He was simply dead.

Well, in the UK more than £50m has been allocated by David Cameron's government for a commemoration of the centenary of the start of World War I in 2014. **But**, alongside, is another campaign which calls for an approach to the anniversary to ensure

that it is used to promote peace and international co-operation. The text of a campaign letter says: Next year marks the 100th anniversary of the beginning of the First World War. Far from being a "war to end all wars" or a "victory for democracy", this was a military disaster and a human catastrophe.

We believe it is important to remember that this was a war that was driven by big powers' competition for influence around the globe, and caused a degree of suffering all too clear in the statistical record of 16 million people dead and 20 million wounded....."

This campaign, bringing together Stop the War and other anti-war groups and individuals, will involve a series of events and actions next year. Go to www.ww1.stopwar.org.uk to add your name to the letter and check the site for regular updates.

And a number of peace groups have produced a document 'Opposing World War 1: Courage and Conscience',

extracts of which appear in our centrespread. It celebrates those who opposed the war and highlights relevant initiatives going on next year. *From Vocation for Justice Autumn 2013*

Petition: Stop recruitment of 16 year olds into the UK armed forces

We call on the UK Government to stop its policy of allowing 15 year olds to apply and 16 and 17 year olds to be recruited into the Armed Forces. The recruitment and targeting of young people and vulnerable groups has been criticised by the United Nations Committee on the Rights of the Child. 2014 is the year to end this policy. Why is this important?

What better way to commit our country to peace during the commemoration of World War One and remember the hundreds of thousands who died from the UK alone, including boy soldiers like Rifleman V J Strudwick who was killed at 15? Why is it that in 2014 the UK is the only country in Europe - and the only country among the permanent members of the UN Security Council - to recruit 16 year olds into its armed forces?

Ministry of Defence is to spend another £37 million in a US programme to extend the life of the missiles which fire the Nuclear warheads from Trident submarines to beyond 2016 - when the decision about renewing Trident subs is to be made.

Concerted action now will change history. We have to break through the defeatism and political cynicism and intensify disarmament pressure on all fronts."

Fukushima woes

Fukushima's woes just keep mounting and mounting.

On 10 August 2013, the New Scientist reported that radioactive water was still seeping into the ocean from the crippled nuclear reactors at the Fukushima nuclear plant.

On 20 August 2013, The New York Times and many newspapers and media outlets around the world, reported another leak. This one involved 300 tons of highly radioactive water from storage tanks which had been built on the site of the ravaged Fukushima power plant. The radioactive release is so serious that the NRA declared that a "radiological release incident" had occurred. The company had not discovered the location of the leak. It is suspected that it had happened

at a seam on the plant or at a valve connected to a gutter. A spokesman for the Tepco management said that workers had attempted to place sandbags around the tank in order to stem the flow of this highly radioactive water. However, it conceded that the contaminated water could enter the ocean, adding to the tons of radioactive water already leaked into the ocean since the accident in March 2011.

Merseyside CND are planning to mark the anniversary, March 11th, in some way to be decided early next year.

Meanwhile Japan Against Nuclear (JAN) are organising a demonstration in London on Saturday March 15th which we hope to support by running transport—to be decided by Co-ord in the new year. Please contact Merseyside CND if you are interested in joining this campaign.

Nuclear Free L.A. tribute to Nelson Mandela

The NFLA's respect for Nelson Mandela derives partly from the positive role he played in the international campaign for the abolition of nuclear weapons.

NFLA note that, following Mandela's release from prison, South Africa took three major steps to nuclear disarmament (1):

(1) It scrapped its nuclear weapons programme, involving the dismantling of six complete and one partially assembled nuclear device in February 1990, following which South Africa acceded to the United Nations Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) and signed a Comprehensive Safeguards Agreement with the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) in 1991.

(2) It scrapped its ballistic missile programme, which led to its admission to the Missile Technology Control Regime (MTCR) in 1995.

(3) It dismantled its biological and chemical warfare programme.

As such, NFLA acknowledges the unique position South Africa occupies in the world as being the first country to have voluntarily dismantled its nuclear weapons capability. It calls on all nuclear weapon states to consider similar actions under the auspices of a Nuclear Weapons Convention. The South African decision to scrap its nuclear weapons programme has boosted its moral authority on the issue of non-proliferation and it remains an active part of the international community seeking to build a nuclear weapons free world.

On the 21st September 1998, President Mandela gave an impassioned speech to the United Nations General Assembly calling on the Nuclear Weapon States to make a firm commitment to eliminating nuclear

weapons and on the global community to eradicate poverty. He said:

"The very first resolution of the General Assembly, adopted in January 1946, sought to address the challenge of 'the elimination from national armaments of atomic weapons and all other major weapons adaptable to mass destruction'.

We must face the fact that after countless initiatives and resolutions, we still do not have concrete and generally accepted proposals supported by a clear commitment by the Nuclear Weapons States to the speedy, final and total elimination of nuclear weapons and nuclear weapons capabilities.

We take this opportunity to salute our sister Republic of Brazil for its decision to accede to the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, and urge all others that have not done so to follow this excellent example.

In an honest attempt to contribute to the definition of the systematic and progressive steps required to eliminate these weapons and the threat of annihilation which they pose, South Africa together with Brazil, Egypt, Ireland, Mexico, New Zealand, Slovenia and Sweden will be submitting a draft resolution to the First Committee for consideration by this Assembly.

This is appropriately titled: 'Towards a Nuclear Weapon Free World: The Need for a New Agenda'.

I call on all members of the United Nations seriously to consider this important resolution and to give it their support. We must ask the

question, which might sound naive to those who have elaborated sophisticated arguments to justify their refusal to eliminate these terrible and terrifying weapons of mass destruction - why do they need them anyway!

In reality, no rational answer can be advanced to explain in a satisfactory manner what, in the end, is the consequence of Cold War inertia and an attachment to the use of the threat of brute force, to assert the primacy of some States over others." (2)

As the world remembers the legacy of Nelson Mandela, the NFLA publicises this speech at a time of slow progress in moves to reduce current stockpiles of nuclear weapons. We hope Mr Mandela may rest in peace.

NFLA Chair Councillor Mark Hackett said:

"The anti-apartheid and the anti-nuclear weapons movements were greatly enhanced by the pivotal role played by Nelson Mandela. Both movements arose out of a feeling of injustice that powerful States were ignoring the will of the great majority of the people of this world. Mandela was instrumental in leading South Africa to a democratic future and removing its capacity to be a nuclear weapon state. NFLA will work with Mayors for Peace, other groups and national governments to fulfil Mandela's wish for a world free from nuclear weapons."

Red Cross and Red Crescent

The International Red Cross and Red Crescent movement at a meeting of their Council of Delegates has adopted a resolution reaffirming another of 2011,

'appealing to all States to ensure that nuclear weapons are never again used...(and calling) on all governments to pursue in good faith and conclude with urgency and determination, negotiations to prohibit the use of and completely eliminate nuclear weapons through a legally binding international agreement'.

The delegates from the UK did not vote in favour of this resolution. How about writing to the Red Cross to ask them to review their decision.

Joseph Rotblat and the Liverpool Connection

Joseph Rotblat was born, brought up in Poland. He studied nuclear physics and in 1939 was invited to study in Paris with Marie Curie and at Liverpool University with James Chadwick. They were both involved with the Manhattan Project in the USA. He left the Project in 1944 when it became clear that Germany had abandoned the idea of a nuclear bomb. He was the only physicist to leave the Manhattan Project on the grounds of conscience, though others later refused to work on atomic bombs after the defeat of Japan.

Nuclear fallout

Rotblat returned to Britain to become senior lecturer and acting director of research in nuclear physics at the University of Liverpool. He decided not to return to communist Poland and naturalised as a British subject, and was joined by his mother, sister, and one of his brothers. He felt betrayed by the use of atomic weapons against Japan, and campaigned for a three-year moratorium on all atomic research.

Rotblat was determined that his research should have only peaceful ends, and so became interested in the medical and biological uses of radiation. In 1949, he became Professor of Physics at St Bartholomew's Hospital ("Barts"),

London, shortly before receiving his PhD from Liverpool in 1950.

At St Bartholomew's, Rotblat worked on the effects of radiation on living organisms, especially on aging and fertility. This led him to an interest in nuclear fallout, especially strontium-90 and the safe limits of ionising radiation. In 1955, he demonstrated that the contamination caused by the fallout after the Castle Bravo test at Bikini Atoll nuclear test by the United States would have been far greater than that stated officially.

Peace work

Rotblat believed that scientists should always be concerned with the ethical consequences of their work. He became one of the most prominent critics of the nuclear arms race, was the youngest signatory of the Russell-Einstein Manifesto in 1955, and chaired the press conference that launched it. After the positive coverage of the manifesto, Cyrus Eaton offered to fund the influential Pugwash Conferences on Science and World Affairs. With Bertrand Russell and others, Rotblat organised the first of these in 1957 and continued to work within their framework until his death. Despite the Iron Curtain and the Cold War, he advocated establishing links between scientists

from the West and East. For this reason, the Pugwash conferences were viewed with suspicion. Initially the British government thought them little more than "Communist front gatherings".

By the early 1960s the Ministry of Defence thought that the Pugwash Conferences were "now a very respectable organization", and the Foreign Office stated that it had "official blessing" and that any breakthrough may well originate at such gatherings. In parallel with the Pugwash Conferences, Rotblat also joined with Einstein, Oppenheimer, Russell and other concerned scientists to found the World Academy of Art and Science, which was proposed by them in the mid-1950s and formally constituted in 1960. After the breakthrough of the Partial Nuclear Test Ban Treaty, Rotblat was in 1965 made a CBE.

In 1995 He jointly with the Pugwash organisation won the Nobel Prize for Peace.

In 1997 he was invited to be the guest speaker at the convocation of Liverpool University.

About Pugwash

The purpose of the Pugwash Conferences is to bring together, from around the world, influential scholars and public figures concerned with reducing the danger of armed conflict and seeking cooperative solutions for global problems. Meeting in private as individuals, rather than as representatives of governments or institutions, Pugwash participants exchange views and explore alternative approaches to arms control and tension reduction with a combination of candour, continuity, and flexibility seldom attained in official East-West and North-South discussions and negotiations. Yet, because of the stature of many of the Pugwash participants in their own countries (as, for example, science and arms-control advisers to governments, key figures in academies of science and universities, and former and future holders of high government office), insights from Pugwash discussions tend to penetrate quickly to the appropriate levels of official policy-making.

The Pugwash Conferences take their name from the location of the first meeting, which was held in 1957 in the village of Pugwash, Nova Scotia, Canada, birthplace of the American philanthropist Cyrus Eaton, who hosted the meeting. The stimulus for that gathering was a Manifesto issued in 1955 by Bertrand Russell and Albert Einstein -- and signed also by Max Born, Percy Bridgman, Leopold Infeld, Frederic Joliot-Curie, Herman Muller, Linus Pauling, Cecil Powell, Joseph Rotblat, and Hideki Yukawa -- which called upon scientists of all political persuasions to assemble to discuss the threat posed to civilization by the advent of thermonuclear weapons. The 1957 meeting was attended by 22 eminent scientists (seven from the United States, three each from the Soviet Union and Japan, two each from the United Kingdom and Canada, and one each from Australia, Austria, China, France, and Poland).

From that beginning evolved both a continuing series of meetings at locations all over the world -- with a growing number and diversity of participants -- and a rather decentralized organizational structure to coordinate and finance this activity. By late 2002, there have been over 275 Pugwash Conferences, Symposia, and Workshops, with a total attendance of over 10,000 (there are now in the world over 3500 "Pugwashites", namely individuals who have attended a Pugwash meeting and are hence considered associated with Pugwash and receive our newsletter).

The Conferences, which are held annually, are attended by 150 to 250 people; the more frequent topical Workshops and Symposia typically involve 30 to 50 participants. A basic rule is that participation is always by individuals in their private capacity (not as representatives of governments or organizations).
