Anti-Trident Lobby of Parliament

On 4 November CND held a mass lobby of Parliament against Trident replacement. Members, or supporters, wishing to participate could arrange an appointment with their MP by using the CND website to send an e-mail, or by contacting their MP directly.

You can of course see your MP to talk about Trident by arranging a meeting at a local surgery, but mass action has more impact. Perhaps.

The Lobby was to take place between 1.00 and 5.00. My MP, Louise Ellman, Labour and Co-operative for Liverpool Riverside, arranged to meet me at 3.00. Before meeting their MP lobbyists were to go to a committee room CND had hired for the day. We signed in and were given two things to give to our MP: The CND Briefing -'Trident Mythbuster' and a copy of the journal 'Medicine, Conflict and Survival' for August 2014 for the speech by F.W. de Klerk at the nuclear exits conference in Helsinki in October 2013 - 'The importance of rejecting the Gollum's ring of nuclear power'. [In this case 'nuclear power' meaning 'nuclear armed state'.]

Sitting in this room, talking with others who had come to lobby their MP, and some who had no appointment but had come anyway in the hope that one could be arranged on the day, I felt safe. Together we would stop our politicians from drifting blindly into a nuclear war.

Later, I met Mrs Ellman in Central Lobby. I asked her if she was for Trident or against. She said she was "For", but it was up for review and she was listening to the arguments. She asked me what I thought. I said

there were many arguments against it, but I was against it on moral grounds and elaborated a bit. I then asked her why she was for Trident. She said in today's uncertain world we need a deterrent. I thought: the last thing we need in an uncertain world is nuclear weapons - they make the world more uncertain. But what I said was: nuclear weapons were from the Cold War and I didn't agree with them then, but they won't deter Al Qaeda or Isis. She then admitted that you couldn't prove whether deterrence worked or not. I agreed, but not wanting to get involved in a discussion on deterrence theory and seeing she felt it was nearly time to get back to her office I showed her the two documents CND had asked me to give her. She looked at them very seriously and said she would study them. I said I hoped she would have the time. She insisted she would make sure she had the time, because I had taken the trouble of coming all the way to London to see her.

Back in Liverpool I decided to follow up our face-to-face meeting with an e-mail. I thanked her for agreeing to meet me and then reiterated and elaborated on my arguments.

"For me any discussion of nuclear bombs has to start with Hiroshima. The nuclear bombing of Hiroshima was mass murder. An atrocity that must never be repeated. The destruction of the city and people was not just by the 6,000 degree heat of the explosion, it was by radiation, which causes cancers in survivors and genetic deformities in the children of survivors. There can be no moral justification for the use of such a weapon.

A Trident submarine has the capacity to launch up to 192 independentlytargeted warheads, and each warhead has a destructive power 25 times that of the Hiroshima bomb. That means a Trident submarine can create 192 Hiroshimas, which is morally barbaric. To give each bomb a destructive power 25 times Hiroshima is totally insane.

In the time of the Cold War we lived under an uneasy peace where each side lied and bluffed about their ability to destroy the other. This led to an ever more dangerous and expensive arms race. These arms kept the peace, it was said, because each side having them meant Mutually Assured Destruction and this meant no one would use them.

But what does it say about our country that we are willing to threaten other countries with nuclear annihilation?

Nuclear deterrence only works if you are prepared to use nuclear bombs and if the enemy country believes you will use them.

So a nuclear bomb is not a theoretical construct – it is part of our warfighting arsenal.

Having nuclear bombs makes us barbaric. They don't keep us free, they keep us in chains to the Military.

Since using these weapons would cause unbearable damage to our planet and unspeakable misery to millions of people, I hope you will vote against Trident when it comes up for renewal."

The Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty and Trident replacement

Echoing the Charter of the United Nations in its call for Peace, the preamble to the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) of 1968 opens:

"Considering the devastation that would be visited upon all mankind by a nuclear war and the consequent need to make every effort to avert the danger of such a war ..."

Then in its Articles it lays out measures to prevent the proliferation of nuclear weapons. Article VI states:

"Each of the Parties to the Treaty undertakes to pursue negotiations in good faith on effective measures relating to the cessation of the nuclear arms race at an early date and to nuclear disarmament, and on a treaty on general and complete disarmament under strict and effective international control."

Replacing Trident is clearly against the spirit of the NPT. And it is difficult to see how a country can pursue negotiations in good faith on effective measures relating to nuclear disarmament while at the same time it is maintaining its nuclear arsenal. Thus Rabinder Singh QC and Professor Christine Chinkin conclude that Trident replacement is in violation of Article VI of the NPT.

Pax Christi pilgrimage of pardon, reconciliation and peace – November 2015

How different is the remembrance of war in a land and among a people destroyed by war! This is one of the strongest feelings I took away from our Pax Christi Peace Pilgrimage in Flanders between 29th October and 1st November.

Twenty members of Pax Christi British section joined with Pax Christi members from Germany, Flanders, Wallonie Bruxelles, France and P.C.I. to mark the 70th anniversary of our movement and the centenary of the First World War in a spirit of pardon, reconciliation and peace.

Our home for our few days was the Peace Village in Mesen near the French border and a short drive from Ypres. Within an hour of our arrival we were 'exposed' to the madness that had locked this region into war for four years, destroying and flattening everything within sight. The only thing not destroyed in Mesen was the crypt of the medieval church of Saint Nicolas which served as a German field hospital. Today, in a spirit of resilience and in a commitment to peace the Church has been completely rebuilt, with 58 Pax Bells, peeling each hour, in honour of Peace and Mary, mother of God. Nearby, the newlycreated Irish Peace Park with memorials to both the Unionist and Nationalist who died in the area, with flag stones carrying words and poems of peace from many who were killed during the Battle of Mesen/Messines.

The impact war had on the civilian population was thoughtfully presented by Piet Chielsens, co-ordinator of the Flanders Field Museum. Images of a flattened Ypres, of refugees, of those who refused to leave but stayed to search through the rubble and fill in shell holes and give witness to the city that once was Ypres. We could replace the word Ypres for Homs or Damascus or Kabul, or any of the cities of today where life is destroyed by war, and where human resilience will not give in to violence. It was in this area that chlorine gas was first used with devastating results. Our group quickly made the link with the use of chemical weapons in our time - the Iraq-Iran War, their use against the Kurds and more recently in Syria and the use at this time of tear gas in Palestine.

The experiences affirmed us in our work for peace. The past urges us to say a clear NO to war. So we must work to stop the arms trade which plays a major part in creating conflict which inflames the refugee crisis of today. We must resist being manipulated by propaganda - messages and stories and images that seek to dehumanise others and so allow us too easily to inflict torture and violence on one another. We must not allow war to become sanitised or romanticised, glossed over. Rather we must expose its real costs to human life, community and the environment.

Our main pilgrimage date ended at the German cemetery of Vladslo where the remains of 25, 000 German soldiers are buried. The Kathe Kollwitz sculpture of the Grieving Parents is here: timeless and nation-less images of grief and loss and wasted life. To be there as an international group brought an added quality to our presence and prayer. We lit the Easter candle and carried the light out to the flat granite stones of the cemetery while singing Stay with me, remain here with me, watch and pray.

This time of reflection brought us to the foundation of Pax Christi 1945 when Marthe Dortel Claudot and Mgr. Theas of France began a movement built on forgiveness and reconciliation, especially at that time towards the peoples of Germany. The Peace of Christ - Pax Christi— was born from another lived experience of war and destruction.


