

TRUMP THREATENS A NEW NUCLEAR ARMS RACE!

President Trump has announced plans to withdraw the precipitate a very dangerous new round of nuclear US from the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces (INF) Treaty and to build up America's nuclear arsenal until "Russia and China see sense". The 1987 Treaty banned ground-launched nuclear missiles and led to nearly 2,700 missiles being eliminated in the UK and across Europe. Though China are not signatories to the treaty, President Trump is accusing them, as well as Russia, of developing new ground-launched missiles that threaten NATO countries. Russia, predictably, has responded by warning that, if the US pulls out of the Treaty, Russia will have to increase it's nuclear capability to restore a balance between the two powers. Equally predictably, our Government is unequivocally supporting Trump's threatening and irresponsible behaviour.

What makes this nuclear war mongering so outrageous and irrational is that the US, China and Russia have already enough nuclear bombs to destroy the planet ten times over!

If Trump tears up the INF Treaty, it will end the restraints on nuclear arsenals negotiated by Presidents Reagan and Gorbachev in the 1980s and

escalation. The European Union has sharply criticised President Trump's announcement, fearing that scrapping the INF treaty will open the way for the return of cruise-type missiles to Europe and, potentially revive the spectre that a US nuclear war against Russia will be fought in Europe.

Trump's threat is alarming, but not surprising. He has long advocated increasing America's nuclear arsenal and has already proposed a massive increase in US military spending. His security advisor, John Bolton, believed to be behind this latest threat, is a well known right wing Republican and enthusiastic cold war warrior who has described both the EU and the UN as a threat to America's international interests.

CND tirelessly campaigned against Cruise Missiles on British soil in the 1980s; the iconic Greenham Common peace camp was part of that movement. We will not hesitate to do so again and with your support, alert people to this renewed threat. CND is needed now more than ever!

Reflections on CND Conference 2018

I hadn't been to conference for many years so didn't know quite what to expect. Wow - I was really enthused. The first afternoon (I missed the AGM/financial report etc in the morning) was all about resolutions to campaign on various topics over the next year.

Resolutions 1 and 2 were all about the UK/US special relationship in particular the nuclear special relationship and how we are bound into the US nuclear policy. After several other discussions on resolutions I realised that many things are tied into this relationship. 60 years ago we signed a Mutual Defence Agreement (MDA) which is still in force and due to be renewed in 2024. As most of you know our Trident system is reliant on the US Missiles to fire our warheads. But there are more ties than just this.

Aircraft carriers - At vast expense we have built some new aircraft carriers these are to carry the 45 F35B bombers which we have purchased also at vast expense. (We are planning to order a further 90 some of which may be the F35A which can be fitted to carry nuclear bombs. RAF Marham will be the main NATO training and maintenance area for these weapons). These new bombers are supposedly having a game changing capability to penetrate the most sophisticated air defence systems.' This policy now entails the US going in for new smaller nuclear weapons which could be useable! So Conference asks CND to raise the profile of these issues in

preparation to challenge the renewal of MDA, in particular in debates around UK defence policy. Action: -We need to request our MPs to demand a debate on the special relationship, including the failure of both governments to engage with the UN treaty on Nuclear Prohibition.

Resolution 3 - Global Ban

Update on signatories - 69 countries have signed so far and 19 of those have ratified it including Austria, Iceland, San Merino and the Holy See!! All the NATO countries are being discouraged from signing it! Conference resolved to up the campaigning on this issue in particular getting our government to engage with it in accordance with its commitments under the Non-Proliferation Treaty. Action We must all encourage our MPs to sign the ICAN parliamentary pledge in support of the global ban. This is "We, the undersigned parliamentarians, warmly welcome the adoption of the UN Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons of 7th July 2017 as a significant step towards the realization of a nuclear-weapon-free world. We share the deep concern expressed in the preamble about the catastrophic humanitarian consequences that would result from any use of nuclear weapons and we recognize the consequent need to eliminate these inhumane and abhorrent weapons. As Parliamentarians, we pledge to work for the signature and ratification of this landmark treaty by our respective countries, as we consider the abolition of nuclear weapons to be a global public good of the highest order and an essential step to promote the security and well-being of all peoples.

Resolution 4 - Nuclear risks

The risks of nuclear war have not been so relevant for many years till President Trump arrived on the scene. But despite him the Koreans are now talking to each other. Most countries are standing firm against Trumps withdrawal from the Iran deal despite threats on trade. Many groups worldwide are making peace initiatives of their own.

Resolution 6 NATO expansion - When the Berlin wall fell part of the agreement with the Warsaw Pact countries was that we didn't expand into their countries - Instead NAto has gone out of its way to encourage all the Warsaw pact countries to join NATO thereby being a threat to Russia which in itself is destabilising in Europe.. NATO has started to expand into S. America - in particular Colombia despite S America and the Caribbean being a nuclear free zone. Conference requests CND to produce more up to date info on NATO expansion and to discourage the Government from agreeing to NATO expansion.

Resolution 7 - Church of England motion to support the global ban. Along with most Churches in the World Council of Churches the C of E has at last taken a stand against nuclear weapons! Action- It is up to us to engage with Christian organisations to explain the UN Treaty on Nuclear Prohibition to them. This could be through your local church, Mothers Union, and non-church groups such as Women's Institutes, Soroptimists, etc

Resolution 8 - Nuclear Power.

Nuclear Power has no basis for its existence other than the nuclear weapon programme; nuclear waste – government is encouraging communities to have waste dumps in their area. Action -We need to campaign against this in our communities.

Other resolutions referred to CND updating info on diversification from the Arms trade and the existence of UK and US bases worldwide.

Remembrance White Poppies are for a culture of Peace

What will we be remembering?

Armistice Day marked the day the fighting stopped on Nov 11th 1918. The Annual ceremony was cancelled in 1939 when a few weeks previously British troops once more landed on mainland Europe and the fighting resumed. The public meaning of the Armistice—victory and warning against future wars—was dependent on there being Peace. The declaration of another war so soon after the last shattered that meaning. Since then the meaning of Remembrance Day has become fluid; in a new guise and periodically refreshed to meet new PR challenges, Remembrance Sunday has come to serve as a justification of war and exhortation to eternal vigilance—the passing of the torch—and selling red poppies which are now the corporate logo of the British Legion. Today for some Remembrance Day has private significance; for the rest of us its public face is a spectacle appropriated for specific financial and political purposes.

As we mark the centenary of WW1 we are urged to think deeply about that war. We would do well to note that by the time Armistice Day was cancelled in 1939 it had already changed profoundly from its original public conception as time for mourning and reflection on loss of life into a self-validating day out for the military, a powerful recruitment tool for the Ministry of War and lots of 'victory' parties.

In 1914 the British government proclaimed they were fighting German militarism, but not a year has gone by since then when the British Military have not been engaged in fighting somewhere in the world. No other country can boast of or be shamed by such a record. Militarism is alive and well in today's Britain.

Militarism is not just the outward show of bellicose rhetoric, medals and soldiers proudly marching through

towns when returning from wars, or the parading in front of the monarch is serried ranks. It is the cast of mind and belief system that privilege the age-old values embodied in war fighting. A cast of mind that sends princes and prime ministers to sell weapons to even the most unsavoury despots, a cast of mind that funds research and production of ever more devastating weapons and associated technology. A cast of mind that believes that people trained to kill can provide an especially beneficial role model in schools and pass on their values to young people. A cast of mind that without us apparently noticing is eyeing our cities as battlegrounds to be surveyed and patrolled where we are viewed with suspicion and have to prove our innocence. The distinction between policing, intelligence and the military becomes blurred, as does the distinction between war and peace and local and global operations.

War has become the dominant metaphor to describe much of the world around us—war against drugs and crime, war against terror, against insecurity. These are not just a sloppy use of language but reflections of stealthy militarisation of a wide range of policy debates as well as popular culture.

The deeper inspiration for the white poppy lies in the widespread movement against war and militarism in the early years of the 20th century. It urges us to challenge militarism and work for a culture of peace. It urges us to have the courage of the conscientious objector of WW1 to resist the temptation to participate in the war machine.

"There can be no compromise with war; it cannot be reformed or controlled; cannot be disciplined into decency or codified into common sense, for war is the slaughter of human beings, temporarily regarded as enemies, on as large a scale as possible."

Remembering WW1 Conscientious Objectors

On March 26th 2016 peace activists from Merseyside Peace Network marked 100 years since conscription was enacted during WW1. This was a tribute reading of some of the names of the Conscientious Objectors (COs) who were incarcerated in Walton Prison. On Nov 11th this year we will be back at Walton Prison again remembering the COs who continued to be incarcerated after the armistice. The suffering that these COs endured must never be forgotten. The last of the COs were still being called up and imprisoned as late as 1919. We will read out the names of those who were imprisoned at Walton and the names of COs who are currently jailed throughout the world. This is in advance of us marking Prisoners for Peace Day on December 1st.

CND conference continued Day 2 - Grass roots campaigning

Four speakers discussed what they were doing and all present had a chance to make contributions about what they as individuals or part of a group were doing. Hereford Peace Council, although having only a very few activists, had decided to get all other interested groups involved in a 'peace' train from Chester to Newport,

collecting messages (letters or petitions) calling on the Government to sign the Global Nuclear Ban Treaty. See page 4. The moral was that even if you are only a few activists- there are allies in other campaigning groups who will help. Other speakers were talking about involving students perhaps via other groups again such as Greens. All recognised the difficulties of having few activists but also campaigning with other campaigning groups.

the UNESCO World Heritage Status Site we settled into Mrs. Danvers Café in the beautiful Port of Liverpool Building to finalise plans for the day.

From there we went by minibus, hired for the day, to join young members of the Japanese NW Community waiting for us in the Town Hall with Green Party Cllr. Lawrence Brown. Also joining us for the day from Manchester were Sean Morris, Secretary of NFLA and Mayors for Peace Chapter and Billy Smith a

student on secondment working with Sean. A civic reception followed with the Lord Mayor of Liverpool, Cllr. Christine Banks, (seen right with Ms Michiko Tsukamoto) including a grand tour of the Town Hall.

Next stop was Liverpool College, Mossley Hill where we were warmly welcomed for lunch by a group of about ten Sixthformers who were given first hand descriptions by Michiko Tsukamoto of her experiences as a child in Hiroshima when the bomb

fell and her family's harsh





life in the years that followed. This was a good introduction for Cathy and Barbara who will be talking to the whole V1 form next month as part of Merseyside peace groups Peace Education project.

In the two hours before the meeting at 4.30pm we had a whistle stop tour of Liverpool, visiting both Cathedrals, going down Hope Street and past the Peace Garden and through Sefton Park, so beautiful at this time of the year. Some of the visitors wanted to see the John and Yoko exhibition at the Liverpool Museum, so we made our way there and they were delighted with it.

Believe it or not we hadn't really had a chance to have a proper meal, so two of the group went food shopping before we all collapsed and grazed in the minibus as we headed back for the final event.

The meeting was held at the Jack Jones House. We thank PCS Union for all their help in putting on this important event which attracted a good turn-out. The visitors brought with them a very impressive



exhibition, sponsored by Mayors for Peace (we hope to get a copy for future events). It must be said that the emotions when hearing the memories of the Hiroshima survivor had many people in tears.


